



# Dorsey Hall Garden Club

While on vacation this summer, I went hiking through a moss laden wood. Cool and green, it was almost magical. Tall pines along with oaks and maples and a few white birch trees provided a shady reprieve from the intense summer sun. The feeling has stayed with me and I started thinking how too often, our desire for the perfect fescue lawn has made areas of moss in our yards the enemy; something to be eradicated and replaced.

In Annie Martin's book, <u>The Magical World of Moss Gardening</u>, I found out a few interesting and beneficial facts about this green carpet like plant. Mosses, along with Liverworts and Hornworts are small non-vascular flowerless plants. Their spores are spread by the wind and they grow in moist and shaded places, on the ground and on trees and rocks. These facts we may know, but there are also many benefits to consider if you are deciding whether to keep or remove moss from your yard.

Mosses are ecofriendly! They require no chemicals, no fertilizers, pesticides or herbicides. Thus, reducing groundwater contaminates into our streams and waterways. And we all know the benefits of clean water. Mosses don't require mowing, which reduces your time and improves air quality. They also control erosion. Since they are an upright grower with long rhizoids, they are a good alternative for steep banks and slopes. They are also an excellent plant for carbon sequestration. Martin writes in her book, "Sphagnum peatlands soak up vast amounts of carbon dioxide from the air, far exceeding the rate of carbon sequestration by all rainforests combined."

The benefits of moss extend beyond our yards. There are medical uses also. Mosses can absorb a third of their weight in water. Matins writes, "The absorbent properties of mosses have provided medicinal and hygienic options for people throughout history." Some varieties have been used to treat colds, tumors, cancer, fungus and much more. Native American women chewed the stems of Pollytrichum moss to ease the pain of childbirth and used them in concocting brews and ointment from leaves as treatment for fevers, aches and other pains. A quick read on the medical uses of mosses reveals a rich history practiced in many cultures around the world.

There are few moss gardens in the Western Hemisphere, and scientific works have mentioned such gardens in America as early as the 1930's. Some were even incorporated into the designs by Frederic Law Olmsted, (1822–1903); the American landscape architect of Central Park. Moss is often integrated into an overall garden design, especially if they feature Japanese or Asian elements. The *Addy Aldrich Rockefeller Garden* in Mt. Desert Island Maine, has used this technique in a portion of their design which features a Spirit Path. In this part of the garden, moss blends with the placement of seventeenth- and eighteenth-century Korean stone sculptures brought back from the Rockefellers' travels. Here, the use of moss gives a 'other world' feel to the space and overall design.

Public gardens featuring mosses are noted in Martin's book. Examples are; the *Golden Gate Park Garden* in San Francisco, the *Portland Japanese Garden* in Oregon among others. Closer to home, we have the *Hume's Japanese Stroll Garden* in Mill Neck NY, the *Woodland Garden* in Brevard, NC, the *Duke Garden*, in Durham NC, the *Liela Barnes and the Cheatham Learning Moss Garden* in Highland, NC. Martin also lists several private gardens open to the public.

So, now when I look at my own backyard, I see how one can build a design that connects nature to the human spirit. I see the benefit that nature has provided in the growth of moss along my steam and in shaded parts of the yard. The beauty of this discovery changed my approach to gardening and has opened up new possibilities.

Bulk Trash Items: Residents receiving County-provided curbside trash collection are eligible for curbside bulk trash and metal collection. Residents in private areas that do not receive County collection are not eligible for bulk pickup. Remember: Bulk trash items collected by the County will be sent to a landfill. Residents may call 410-313-6444. Large trash items (individual items which do not fit in trash cans) such as mattresses, box springs, chairs, sofas, dressers and tables will be collected. Place these items at the curb on your regular trash day. Maximum of 4 large trash items will be collected per pick-up. Items must be able to be lifted by two collection crew members (larger items will be tagged and left for the resident's disposal). Bulk metal items include metal swing sets, file cabinets, appliances, lawn mowers, exercise equipment, etc. must be scheduled. Please remove doors from refrigerators, and drain oil and gas from lawn mowers. Please go to:




