Trash cans-Recycling bins

With the warmer weather, complaints about trashcans/recycling bins have multiplied since winter. Trashcans and recycling bins need to be stored out of sight after they have been emptied by the County collectors. Hiding them between your car and garage door makes it even more noticeable. Remember to mow your lawn with the frequency of good property management. Please remember property owners adjacent to sidewalks must maintain the grassy areas on both sides of the sidewalk (mowing, watering, seeding, etc.) on portions parallel to one's property. Howard County Code of Ordinances 18.402 Public Works—Sidewalks: a) It shall be the duty and obligation of the owner of property abutting a public right-of-way to maintain the abutting sidewalk, driveway apron and sod or grass within the public right-of-way in such condition as to be safe for public use.

To make this a bit clearer.... if your property touches any county sidewalk (front, side, rear), you must mow the strip of grass between the roadway and the sidewalk.

Our **Resident Architectural Committee (RAC)** members are volunteers who reside in our Village

They typically meet twice a month to review Exterior Alteration applications. They visit each property prior to the meeting. Each member brings their unique work experience to the table and they always strive to work with the residents.

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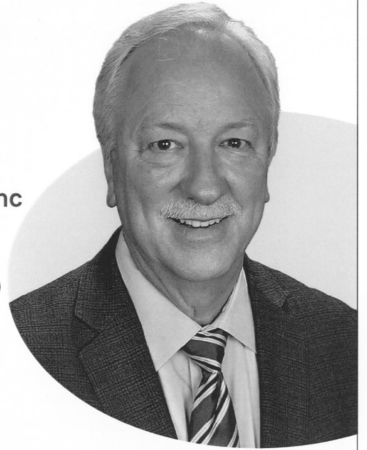

Important Numbers

The Howard County Bureau of Highways is responsible for pavement, sidewalks, storm drains, trees, and over 970 miles of county roads for the convenience and safety of the public. If you see a problem within the village please call the appropriate number below or use the TellHoCo App that can be downloaded onto your cell phone. Tell-HoCo may also be accessed by visiting the County website at www.howardcountymd.gov

Traffic Engineering Division...This division is responsible for traffic signals, streetlight installation, street signs, and traffic calming and safety. 410-313-2430.

Street Signs...The Sign and Marking Division is responsible for all existing street signs and pavement markings. To report damaged or down sign, contact 410-313-7450. To inquire about the installation of a new sign, contact 410-313-2430.

To Report a Highway Maintenance concern such as road condition, sidewalks, storm drainage or street trees, contact the Highways Operations Division at 410-313-7450 or by email: highways@howardcountymd.gov.

To Report a Traffic Control concerns such as intersection safety, traffic calming, street lights and miss-timed traffic signal or school flasher, contact the Traffic Engineering Division at 410-313-2430 or by email: traffic@howardcountymd.gov.

Bulk Trash Items: Residents receiving County-provided curbside trash collection are eligible for curbside bulk trash and metal collection. Residents in private areas that do not receive County collection are not eligible for bulk pickup. Remember: Bulk trash items collected by the County will be sent to a landfill. Residents may call 410-313-6444. Large trash items (individual items which do not fit in trash cans) such as mattresses, box springs, chairs, sofas, dressers and tables will be collected. Place these items at the curb on your regular trash day. Maximum of 4 large trash items will be collected per pick-up. Items must be able to be lifted by two collection crew members (larger items will be tagged and left for the resident's disposal). Bulk metal items include metal swing sets, file cabinets, appliances, lawn mowers, exercise equipment, etc. must be scheduled. Please remove doors from refrigerators, and drain oil and gas from lawn mowers. Please go to:

Trash and Recycling Pick-up: there are holidays that the County has moved pick up to a slide schedule. If you have further questions, please Call 410-313-6444 or visit their website at: www.howardcountymd.gov/holidayschedule

All trash and recycling cans should be removed from the street on the pick-up day and stored out of sight.

Yard Trim Collection: Howard County offers yard trim collection on the same day as recycling collection. Do not use plastic bags for your yard trim—it will not be collected. Use paper bags or reusable containers without lids only. Howard County offers the “**Feed the Green Bin**” program in our Village. Cul—de-Sac Beautification

The Dorsey's Search Community Association has decided to grant money towards the beautification of 2 cul-de-sacs in the Village. Each grant will be \$250. Once the Village reviews and approves the plan, the application will be sent to the County for their consideration. The applicant will be notified once the County approves the plan. Only then can items be purchased for the project. To receive the \$250 reimbursement, submit all original receipts to the Village Office by July 15, 2025. **No exceptions.** An application is on the next page, but will also be available at the Village Office or online at : <https://www.dorseyssearch.org/wp-content/uploads/2025/02/CulDeSacApp.pdf>. The Village will start accepting applications on March 3, 2025.

The following items are required by the County:

- Picture of the cul-de-sac
- Petition signed by 80% of residents in the cul-de-sac
- Proposed planting plan, drawing
- List of specific plants to be used

The Village and County will not be responsible for what is planted in the cul-de-sac. Residents must agree to the upkeep of the cul-de-sac which may include mulching every year. As a reminder, you may NOT have plants that will grow and block the visibility through the island and you may NOT have plants that will grow into the roadway.

Grant money will be distributed on a first come, first serve basis. Only complete applications will be counted as being received. Receipts must be submitted by the deadline. Notes on Pollinator Gardens

In recent years, there has been a marked decline in beneficial insect populations worldwide. For example, the rate of decline for the American butterfly population from 2000 to 2020 is 22% according to a recent NYT article. There are several reasons for this, with *habitat loss*, *pesticide use* and *climate change* being major drivers. It is important to understand, that this phenomenon impacts our ecosystem, affecting food security and biodiversity. You might have noticed this in your own gardens. I know in recent years, in spite of planting native perennials I have observed fewer and fewer butterflies and bees and often wondered what was causing this decline. The reduction in beneficial insects, if continued, will have adverse effects on not only in our individual gardens but on agriculture worldwide. Beneficial insects play an important role in supporting life. Not only do they pollinate plants, but they also break down dead matter, nourishing the soil and providing food for birds and an array of other creatures in the food web, which we are all part of.

David Wagner, entomologist at the University of Connecticut says it best. ***“Nature collapses without them.”*** Although such news can make gardeners feel helpless, there are things that we can do on our own ‘patch’ that encourage beneficial insects which are so vital to promoting pollination. *Beneficial pollinators include not only bees and butterflies, but also moths, beetles, certain flies, like the flower flies, certain parasitic wasps, bats and birds.*

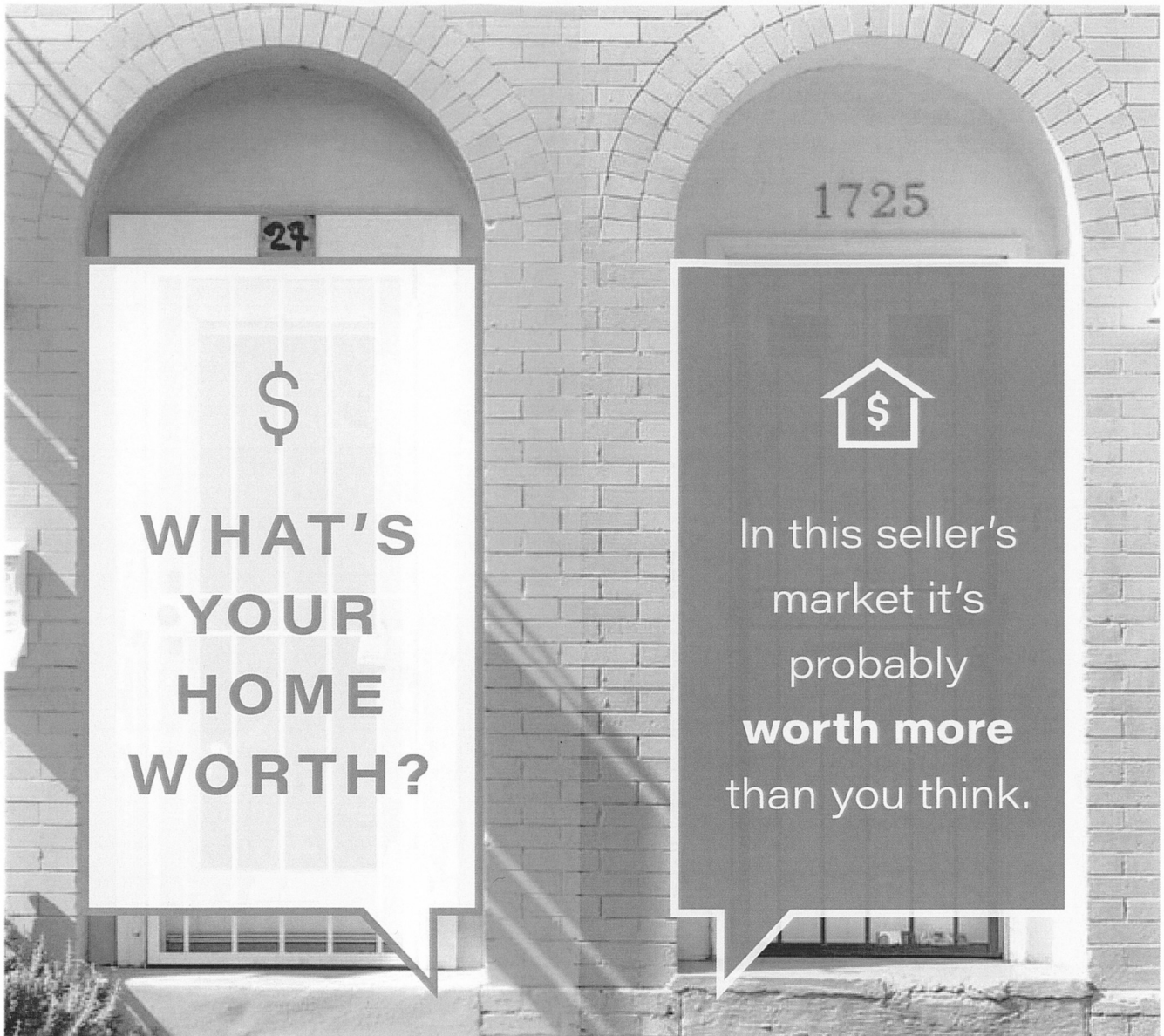
- Food sources are an obvious necessity for pollinators. Flowers provide nectar which is high in sugar and amino acids. When you are planting natives remember to plant more than one plant. A good rule of thumb is to plant in groups of at least three. This allows pollinators to visit the same type of flower, making pollination more effective and using less energy.
- Plant with *bloom seasons* in mind. This is important, because it will provide food from early spring to late fall, supporting pollinators throughout the growing seasons.
- Plant a variety of plants to support a variety of pollinators. Keep in mind that flowers of different colors, fragrance, blooms and heights will attract different pollinator species. Diversity is key to a good pollinator garden.
- Many herbs and some annuals, are also good pollinators. Mint, oregano, garlic, chives, parsley and lavender can be planted throughout your pollinator garden spot, along with annuals like cosmos and zinnias (look for the flat blooms that show the yellow center.)
- Pollinators need protection from severe weather and predators, as well as protected sites for nesting. Small twigs and branch along with leaf litter can shelter these beneficial insects. Incorporate a bee box to encourage solitary, non-aggressive bees to nest on your property.
- Water access is another requirement. Pools, ponds and clean birdbaths can accommodate this need.
- Most importantly limit or eliminate pesticides. These chemical compounds are toxic to pollinators. In an attempt to eradicate one insect, you will be eradicating many more. For example, mosquito spraying is especially harmful to beneficial insects, like bees and butterflies. Pesticides applied to lawns and gardens move through the soil and cannot be designed to kill only one type of pest. As an alternative, look for natural predators and environmentally safe ways to combat specific pest. And remember, ‘what effects one, effects all’.

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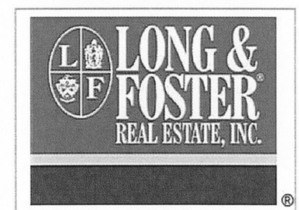
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
